

ARTIST PROFILE: Kevin Nguyen

Pasadena's Kevin Nguyen immigrated to the US from Vietnam as a child. Though first pursuing an education in industrial design, he now devotes himself to ceramics,


an art he discovered while on a scholarship to study abroad in Europe.

Nguyen shows works from three distinct series in the Muckenthaler exhibition opening April 15.

All have origins in the traditional Asian bowl or vase forms, and each each explores a balance between texture and color. The outer surface of a pedestal bowl, for example, appears as parched and cracked as the desert Nguyen says he sometimes visits for inspiration. The inside is an almost intoxicating deep blue, and smooth as glass. His process is "a conversation of proportion with glazes and surfaces," he says. "Nature is a strong influence, but a crack in a sidewalk registers as much as the bark of tree."

Nguyen has travelled extensively throughout Europe, and has visited Vietnam twice as an adult. "When artists travel they look at things in a different way than most people," he says. He tries to understand how colors function from one culture to another. Blue can mean something totally different in one country than it does in another. The inlaid porcelain blues of Nguyen's work can be found in ceramics from Holland to Korea, where the traditions of its use are legend. Nguyen's blues are deep and lustrous, like a bottomless sea. Another shallower bowl is jade green inside, while a larger vase's crackled surface is a study in the subtleties of greys and browns over a blackened core, an effort to reveal the surface underneath a colored glaze on the surface.

His latest project is the Xiem Clay Center,
